REIMAGINING OPERA

The Malta Summer Festival seeks to present opera in an innovative way, bolstering the genre's visibility particularly with younger generations.

Building on the MPO's 20/21 end-of-season Grand Finale which reached 1million views online, the engagement of internationally acclaimed artists underlines the quality presented in the MSF. Additionally, the collaborations between local and foreign practitioners ensure that the festival acts as a bridge promoting Malta as a hub for arts and culture whilst leaving a legacy to the country's creative ecology.

The use of digital platforms and interdisciplinary art forms together with edutainment projects aimed specifically at younger audiences taps the festival's mission of rendering opera more accessible and engaging.

The Malta Summer Festival is presented by the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra (MPO) in collaboration with Arts Council Malta and the Malta Tourism Authority with the support of Hilton Malta, the Ministry for Gozo and the Ministry for the National Heritage, the Arts and Local Government.









VITTORIO GRIGOLO

Tenor

From boy soloist in the Sistine Chapel to principal tenor in the world's most prestigious opera houses, Vittorio Grigolo is the Italian tenor of his generation. Born in Arezzo and raised in Rome, he performs the leading roles of the Italian and French repertory. Recent engagements have taken Vittorio's Traviata, Boheme, Rigoletto, L'Elisir d'Amore, Lucia di Lammermoor, Faust, Roméo et Juliette, Manon, Les Contes d'Hoffmann, Werther and Tosca to the greatest opera stages of the world.

Vittorio's 2018-2019 season includes Rodolfo and the Duke for The Metropolitan Opera, Nemorino at Opéra National de Paris, and Cavaradossi at the Wiener Staatsoper and at Royal Opera, London.

Off of the operatic stage, Vittorio is a successful recording artist with a platinum debut album, a Grammy-nominated recording of Bernstein's West Side Story and four albums with Sony Classical. Live concert performances include his "Italia... un Sogno" tour around Italy and the Concert pour la prise de la Bastille under the Eiffel Tower. His solo recital at The Metropolitan Opera was reviewed as "a truly unforgettable evening" (Latinos Post) with his voice described as "an attractive, ardent and supple instrument that he wielded to passionate effect" (New York Times).

Big screen appearances include The Duke in Andrea Andermann's acclaimed live broadcast of Rigoletto from Mantua, and live, world-wide broadcasts of La Boheme from The Metropolitan Opera, and Boheme and Werther from The Royal Opera, London.

Recent recognition: the Caruso Award and the Tiberini d'Oro (2015), the Distinguished Artistic Leadership Award - The Atlantic Council (2016) and the NIAF Special Achievement award (2017).

In 2018 he was awarded the "Opera News Award" for his outstanding contribution to the world of opera.





MARINA MONZÓ Soprano

Marina Monzó was born in Valencia in 1994. After studying flute, she obtained her diploma in singing at the Conservatorio Superior de Música de Valencia. In 2016, she made her stage debut at the Bilbao Opera, where she performed the title role in La Sonnambula.

She continued her vocal studies at the Accademia Rossini in Pesaro under the direction of Alberto Zedda, singing for several years at the Rossini Opera Festival. She perfected her vocal technique with Isabel Rey, Gioacchino Zarrelli, Mariella Devia, Daniela Dessi, and Renata Scotto, amongst others.

Marina has sung the roles of La Contessa di Folleville in Rossini's Il Viaggio a Reims in Pesaro, Ines in Donizetti's La Favorita, Gilda in Verdi's Rigoletto at Teatro San Carlo di Napoli and Théâtres de la Ville de Luxembourg, Giulia in Rossini's La Scala di Seta, at the Royal Opera House of Muscat and Rossini Opera Festival, as well as Susanna in Mozart's Le Nozze di Figaro and Zerlina in Mozart's Don Giovanni, at the NCPA in Beijing, Fluvia in La Pietra del Paragone at the Rossini Opera Festival, Marola in La Tabernera del Puerto at the Teatro de la Zarzuela, Norina in Don Pasquale and Adina in Donizetti's L'Elisir d'Amore at the Teatro del Maggio Musicale Fiorentino and Despina in Mozart's Così fan tutte at the Palau de les Arts in Valencia.

Future appearances include new productions in Mexico City, Palau de les Arts in Valencia, Teatro Real and Teatro de la Zarzuela.





NICOLA SAID

Maltese Soprano, Malta Airport Foundation Ambassador, BOV Joseph Calleja Foundation Scholar and Peace and Prosperity Trust Young Artist, Nicola Said has an active international career on the operatic and concert stage, performing frequently in her native country and throughout Europe, UK, USA, and the Middle East for top official delegate events.

Having sung a number of operatic roles including Mimì La Bohème with Instant Opera in Normansfield Theatre London, and the title role in Lucia di Lammermoor at the Festival Lyrique-En-Mer Belle-Île in France, Nicola has recently made her operatic film debut as Madeline in Blat (Reuben Pace).

Nicola frequently performs with the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra as a guest singer, having recently recorded La Bohème Act I Finale with conductor Gianluca Marcianò. Nicola is also a frequent performer at Teatru Manoel, where she opened the first recital of the season after the Theatre was shut down due to Covid.

Nicola studied at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama with Yvonne Kenny, completing the Opera Course on full scholarship after her Masters in Performance fully funded by the Malta Arts Scholarship, Government of Malta. She has performed in top venues in UK including Cadogan Hall, St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Barbican Hall, St. John's Smith Square and at the Royal Opera House. She has recorded and premiered Paul Carroll's works at Abbey Road Studios with the Commonwealth Orchestra and has given recitals for HRH The Earl of Wessex in a Duke of Edinburgh event and at St. James's Palace and Kensington Palace.

Nicola is Founder, Director and Artistic Director of Malta Opera, a new opera organisation based in Malta. Conceived at the start of covid and still in its early stages of development, Malta Opera will focus on engaging and promoting local talent while cultivating international collaborations.





ÓLIVER DÍAZ

After studying piano at the Peabody Conservatory of the John Hopkins University, Óliver Diaz was awarded with the prestigious 'Bruno Walter' orchestral conducting scholarship to study at Juilliard School of Music with conductors such as Otto Werner Mueller, Charles Dutoit and Yuri Temirkanov.

He has also worked in important Spanish opera houses such as Palau de Les Arts, Campoamor Theatre, Zarzuela Theatre, Royal Theatre of Madrid, Gran Teatro del Liceu and Teatro de la Maestranza, and outside our borders, in Teatro alla Scala in Milan, Roman Theatre in Orange, and Royal Opera House in Muscat (Oman), also being the first Spanish conductor to debut in the pit of the prestigious Helikon Theatre in Moscow.

Between 2015 and 2019 he held the position of Musical Director of Teatro de la Zarzuela in Madrid, and is a founder member and vice-president of the Spanish Association of Orchestra Directors (AESDO).

In recent years, he has developed his double role as composer and musical arranger in different productions commissioned by Teatro de la Zarzuela and in an extraordinary project by the RTVE Orchestra.

He has to his credit more than a dozen recordings made for record labels NAXOS and Warner Music Spain, amongst others.

Future commitments include his return to Teatro de la Zarzuela, and coliseums such as Teatro de la Maestranza, Campoamor Theatre in Oviedo and Gran Teatro del Liceo, as well as concerts in Madrid, Tenerife and his debut in the ABAO season.





MALTA PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA

For half a century, the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra (MPO) has been Malta's foremost musical institution.

The orchestra was founded in April 1968, when musicians from the defunct "Commander-in-Chief" (C-in-C) orchestra of the Malta-based British Mediterranean Fleet regrouped as the Manoel Theatre Orchestra. It continued to serve as the theatre's resident orchestra until September 1997, when it became an independent orchestra, taking up the name National Orchestra of Malta. The orchestra became the MPO in 2008 when it expanded into a full-size symphony orchestra, bringing together musicians from Malta, Europe and beyond.

Joseph Sammut, the C-in-C's last conductor, was the orchestra's first conductor, remaining at the helm until 1992. Since then, the orchestra has also been under the direction of Joseph Vella, John Galea, Michael Laus, and Brian Schembri. In 2019, the MPO has appointed Sergey Smbatyan as Principal Conductor, joining Resident Conductor Michael Laus as part of the orchestra's Artistic Team. The MPO also works with local and international guest artists including Lawrence Renes, Diana Damrau, José Cura, Mikhail Pletnev, Gil Shaham, Joseph Calleja, Gautier Capuçon, Daniel Lozakovich and Enrico Dindo.

As Malta's leading musical ensemble, the MPO averages more than one performance a week including symphonic concerts, opera productions in Malta and Gozo, community outreach and educational initiatives, as well as various concerts of a lighter nature. During the past seasons, the MPO embarked on a Digital Transformation reaching over 32 million people worldwide through its Online Programme in 2021.

The orchestra has performed in leading venues across the globe, including in the United States, Russia, Dubai, Germany, Austria, China, Italy, and Belgium, and presently embarks on at least one international tour each concert season.

The MPO is a keen exponent of Maltese composers, regularly performing their works in Malta and overseas, as well as frequently premiering and commissioning new compositions.

Through the MPO Academy and the Malta Youth Orchestra, which regularly give concerts across Malta, the MPO is also responsible for the training and professional development of the next generation of Maltese musicians.
